"What my grandmother told me and she never lied" is the title of the



program for our October 3rd meeting. Solveig Astrid Schavland Quinney will be using examples of stories she has heard from clients and the importance of verifying their validity.

When I heard her title it reminded me of information that my grandmother had told me, about how her father had arrived in America three years before the rest of the family. After searching for him in ship

records for 1885, I finally located him as arriving in 1888. This was the same year as the rest of the family, only it was three months earlier. Since my grandmother was only five at the time, it probably seemed to her to have been three years.

Solveig also plans to talk about Bokmål and Nynorsk: the two languages of Norway, how to use Bygdebøker, farm names and the patronymic naming system.

Solveig Schavland Quinney is the library services specialist at the *Norwegian American Genealogical Center and Naeseth Library*, which is dedicated to researching Norwegian heritage. She was born in Stavanger, Norway on the day of the German occupation. In 1949, at the age of nine, she moved with her family from Stavanger, to Story City, Iowa. She has worked at the Norwegian American Genealogical Center since 2002.

She is the author of *Leaving Norway:* A Family Story.



for their October 10, 2013 program on Paul Bunyan to be given by Michael Edmonds, author of "Out of the Northwoods: The Many Lives of Paul Bunyan." The title of the program is: "Bunyan's Progress: How the Private Jokes of Lumberjacks Turned Into America's Best-Known Folk Hero." Edmonds will share his discoveries about Paul Bunyan's origins among Wisconsin loggers in the 1880s. He'll describe where the stories began, how they migrated from logging camps into print, and how publication changed them forever. He'll also share some of the earliest authentic Bunyan stories as they were actually told aloud by Wisconsin lumberjacks during the 1880s and 1890s.

"The True Story of Miss Belle Boyd, Siren of the South"



At the September 5th meeting of the Dane County Area Genealogical Society, attendees were treated to a period dress presentation of the life of the "LaBelle Rebelle," Belle Boyd, a Confederate spy. Wearing a bright yellow hoop skirt dress, Melanie

Lichtfeld, a re-enactor from the Columbus Carriage Festival, did the reincarnation of Belle. Her words filled in the character of Boyd, who died, after a life of extensive travel and three marriages, in Kilbourne City, Wisconsin (now known as the Wisconsin Dells) and is buried in Spring Grove Cemetery outside of Portage close to the junction of routes 46 and 13.

Isabella Marie Boyd, more commonly referred to as "Belle Boyd," was a Confederate spy in the United States Civil War. She was born in 1844 in Martinsburg, Berkeley County, Virginia (which would become West Virginia in 1863) to Benjamin and Mary (Glenn) Boyd. With the country of Boyd's youth embroiled in a festering "states rights" versus "federalism" controversy driven by the issue of slavery, Belle grew up in a family fervently of the "states rights" opinion. Boyd lived a very carefree life as a youth, and, by her own description, she was a "tomboy" who could ride a horse as well as anyone. Her father was able to afford sending Belle to a college or finishing school for girls, Mount Saint Agnes College (Mount Washington Female College) in Baltimore, Maryland.

At the outbreak of the Civil War, her home in Virginia was the site of early battles and skirmishes. During the early part of the war, Belle Boyd shot and killed a "Yankee" who had harassed her mother for displaying a Confederate flag. During the military investigation which followed, a board of inquiry exonerated Belle of murder. This verdict, however, proved to be the

beginning of her active involvement in the Confederate military efforts.

Belle intermingled with Yankee troops stationed in the vicinity of her home, including the "Iron Brigade" from Wisconsin, and through girl wiles and the perceived innocence of youth, Boyd managed to pass troop strength and deployment information on to the Confederate general staff. At this point in the Civil War, civilians could, especially local inhabitants, with a note from the commanding colonel, pass between the combatant lines. Her efforts helped General Stonewall Jackson and the Confederacy in the Shenandoah Valley campaigns of 1862-63. Belle's efforts were not without consequences, she was arrested on three different occasions, avoided the gallows, and spent time in the Old Capitol Prison in Washington, D.C. and at Fort Monroe.

In 1864, Boyd went to England, and there she married her first husband, Captain Samuel Wylde Hardinge, a U.S. Navy officer. Hardinge died in 1866, and Boyd subsequently returned to the United States. Two more marriages and a stage career followed. Boyd died of a heart attack in Kilbourne City, Wisconsin, in 1900. Submitted by Mary Madigan
